The 13th Annual WPB Spring Symposium and Luncheon was held on Monday, April 20th and featured three outstanding leaders. Anna Buckner, a noted estate planning attorney, opened the morning symposium with an overview of the importance of developing a comprehensive planning team to help identify and carry out estate planning needs.

Judge Keith Watkins, Chief Justice of the US District Court, Middle District of Alabama, energized attendees with his morning keynote address about Americans and civic engagement.

Trudy Cathy White, daughter of Chick-fil-A founder Truett Cathy, served as the luncheon keynote speaker. Trudy shared stories from her time as the youngest Chick-fil-A store operator and her thoughts on corporate and nonprofit leadership. And, perhaps her strongest piece of advice fits in both leadership roles- "If you help enough other people get what they want out of life, you will get exactly what you want out of life."

More than 70 Auburn University students and 14 Opelika High School students were sponsored to attend the Spring Symposium and Luncheon. 2015 WPB Scholarship and Philanthropic Impact Grant recipients recognized

During the Sunday Supper, recipients of the 2015 WPB Scholarships and Philanthropic Impact Grants were recognized and honored. More than \$35,000 in scholarships and grants were presented to four students and ten programs in the College of Human Sciences.

An additional \$12,000 is expected to be awarded this fall through scholarships that carry both the names of individual donors and WPB. These additional scholarships will bring WPB's total 2015 philanthropic impact to over \$47,000 and its cumulative impact to more than \$500,000, crossing an important threshold in the 13 year history of WPB's philanthropic footprint.

2015 Student Philanthropy Board Grant Project

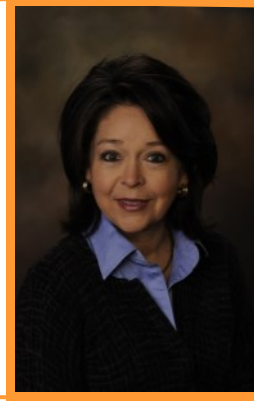
The Student Philanthropy Board, a mentoring initiative of WPB, participated in a community service/learning project during the 2015 Spring Semester. SPB members were asked to research, write, and present grant proposals on behalf of a nonprofit organization on the Auburn University campus. Each member selected an organization and presented his or her grant proposal to the group. Using funds that SPB raised through several fundraising projects, SPB voted as a group to fund two of the grant proposals that were presented.

The Committee of 19, a student organization promoting hunger awareness and Active Minds, a student group promoting mental health issues, received grant funds from SPB. These awards were presented during the 13th Annual WPB Spring Symposium and Luncheon.

By participating in this learning project, SPB members had an opportunity to put into practice knowledge learned in the classroom and to gain hands-on grant writing experience to help prepare them for their future service as nonprofit professionals.
